






We have officially launched our youth mission trip fundraising for our ambitious goal of sending all our youth on a mission trip this summer! Our goal of \$14,000 dollars

Holy Comforter has acknowledged our call to love our neighbors living without. To compassionately and effectively serve and support members of our local community facing housing and food insecurities. We hope to practice radical compassion and empathy for our neighbors in Gaston county.

For the last two summers our youth have visited the Dwelling, served alongside, heard the stories love, and became friends with those who are experiencing homelessness or living below the poverty line.

The Dwelling is Kingdom people seek first the Kingdom of God and its justice; church people often put church work above concerns of justice, mercy, and truth. Church people think about how to get people into the church; Kingdom people think about how to get the church into the world. Church people worry that the world might

change the church; Kingdom people work to see the church change the world.



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Grace and peace,

In a sermon recently I restated a phrase that I've used many times, and at some point I should figure out where to attribute this, that a life of faith is about becoming, not being. The idea is that none of us have, or will ever, entirely understand God, or entirely be who God has created or called us to be. A faithful life is better judged by whether or not we continue to grow, whether we strive for knowing God and being who God created and called us to be, than it is whether we ever entirely achieved it. I think that's true for congregations as well. Another favorite quote of mine is that the church is a hospital for sinners, not a hotel for saints. We don't always get this church thing right as disciples together. Sometimes it is because we struggle to put the time and energy into that it deserves. Sometimes it is because our sinfulness and selfishness get in the way and we struggle to be the best versions of ourselves in this community just like we do in others. Sometimes it is because the world we're in, our context, changes, and the way we've been church in our context no longer works like it did. And so just like an individual life of faith is more about becoming than being, so too is life as a community of faith.

In fall of 2023 we identified three goals for 2024. One was a financial goal to be able to support the ministry Christ is doing in and through Holy Comforter. Another was about developing ministries to reach out to those experiencing hunger, homelessness, and otherwise affected by poverty. The last is a goal name and develop strategies around evangelism, reaching out to people in our community. We're early in the year, but I am excited about some of the work that we've already begun in these areas.

We continue to work with GSB for stewardship, learning how to tell the stories of faith in Holy Comforter to show what we are financially supporting through our giving. We are also working on strategies to help people know the best ways to give consistently to the ministry here.

In January we had an interest meeting for our goal related to hunger, homelessness, and poverty, and had a speaker come in who works with homelessness in Gaston County. Rianna Nance, our champion of this goal, listened to the questions, the interest, and the ideas of our members who attended the meeting. It was a promising start. Rianna is working to build relationships with ministries in our area and is interested in finding ways to educate our congregation on the situations our neighbors are in, and to help us engage in helpful ways going forward. This work will build on things we're already doing like donations to SOCKS Crisis Ministries, Angel Tree donations during Christmas, assistance through benevolence fund, and our support of The Dwelling, which we will be taking a third mission trip to this summer.

For our third goal, we have named both LGBTQ folks and young professionals as target groups for our work. Young professionals are estimated to be the largest growing demographic in Belmont over the next 5-10 years. They're the neighbors moving in, so we will be thinking through how best to build relationships. For my part, I am looking forward to work to reach out to LGBTQ folks because it is a group of people who the Church at large has too often made to feel like there is not a place for them in Christ's church, and often not a place in Christ's love. Holy Comforter is a unique community that already has been a place of healing, connection, and community for folks who have experienced this

rejection, and I look forward to discerning how to extend that work to others. Karen Hinkley is the champion for this goal, and either will be holding, or just has held (depending on when you read this article) an interest meeting to talk about the direction of the work.

We are engaging these goals to continue our work of "becoming," becoming more faithful disciples of Christ and becoming the community of faith God calls us to be. It won't be perfect, we won't get it right all of the time, but together we will faithfully take the next steps on our walk with Christ.




Catawba Valley Brass on Easter Sunday

And recently I have found better words for that than I thought I would ever know. As y'all know, recently I got the treat of presiding over communion for the first time, with permission of the synod. It was an experience I never thought I would have, especially since my call doesn't include sacraments. Yet, there I was in front of all of you blessing the bread and wine for us to consume as a means of God's grace and love for the world.

Let me start by saying, I am immensely grateful that this congregation continues to be a space of grace and learning for me, and that you all continue to be faith community that help shape who I am as a leader. I wouldn't be the leader I am without you. I loved the laughter and grace we shared on Transfiguration Sunday. As we celebrated Jesus revealing himself to the disciples, Jesus revealed himself to me, through you. Y'all are a treasure. Let me continue by saying, I LOVE being a deacon. I love what my call to this church and the larger church is. I love the image of being a bridge between the church and the world. Finding avenues to bringing and being the Body of Christ in the world and bringing the world to the church. Currently for me that looks like raising disciples through youth group and kids club. It takes shape in our outreach efforts by finding faith forming experiences that serve the community and our siblings who live without or in need.

I love our traditions and sacraments. They are beautiful and meaningful means of grace and where God meets us, and I feel called to build the bridge between the church and the world. I feel called to build God's kingdom in the community through equipping disciples, so that when communion is celebrated, we know that all of God's beloved are welcome at the table. That the communion table has a seat for you, and all our siblings. This seems to be a story of where diaconal ministry and communion meet. I'm grateful that God gave us this experience.

It's About Love

Rianna Nance lives in Stanley to raise chickens and attends Holy Comforter to be surrounded by love. In both cases she does this for her family.

Like many of us, Rianna questioned her faith during her college years. After meeting her soon-to-be husband, Tom, they attended a Lutheran church near their homes in Virginia. They were impressed when the

pastor included the LGBTQ community in a prayer. Both Tom and Rianna liked the idea of a theology that emphasized loving <u>all</u> of God's children.

Rianna found that same love at Holy Comforter. "When we moved here I was pregnant with our first child", says Rianna. She and Tom, however, experienced a horror that would forever change them. Their child died in utero. Rianna was devastated. "This was the saddest moment of our lives. Micah came to visit. He was just so present for us." Even though they were new to our church and had not really met many people, members of the Holy Comforter family surrounded them with love and compassion. "I feel God brought us to be with these people," says Rianna. "This was going to happen, but God led us here to be comforted."

Rianna continues to be active at Holy Comforter because of the people and how they impact her family. "My kids can be a bit rambunctious at times," Rianna laughs. "But the people here, like Beka, Jill (Cassel), Jen (Kearney) and Mallory (Morton, Holy Comforter's nursery attendant) can be so patient. They meet my kids where they need to be met".

The love and compassion of the Holy Comforter family impacts the lives of so many people. So does your generosity. It allows your church to fund a loving youth program that meets all children where they need to be met. Thank you.
