EASTER: The exact origins of this religious feast day's name are unknown. Some sources claim the word Easter is derived from Eostre, a Teutonic goddess of spring and fertility. Other accounts trace Easter to the

Latin term hebdomada alba, or white week, an ancient reference to Easter week and the white clothing donned by people who were baptized during that time. Through a translation error, the term later appeared as esostarum in Old High German, which eventually became Easter in English. In Spanish, Easter is known as Pascua; in French, Paques. These words are derived from the Greek and Latin Pascha or Pasch, for *Passover*. Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection occurred after he went to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover (or Pesach in Hebrew), the Jewish festival commemorating the ancient Israelites' exodus from slavery in Egypt. Pascha eventually came to mean Easter.

Easter is really an entire season of the Christian church year, as opposed to a single-day observance. Lent, the 40-day period leading up to Easter Sunday, is a time of reflection and penance and represents the 40 days that Jesus spent alone in the wilderness before starting his ministry, a time in which Christians believe he survived various temptations by the devil. The day before Lent, known as Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday, is a last hurrah of food and fun before the fasting begins. The week preceding Easter is called Holy Week and includes Maundy Thursday, which commemorates Jesus' last supper with his disciples; Good Friday, which honors the day of his crucifixion; and Holy Saturday, which focuses on the transition between the crucifixion and resurrection. The 50-day period following Easter Sunday is called Eastertide and includes a celebration of Jesus' ascension into heaven.

The dyeing of eggs has roots that can be traced back thousands of years to pre-Christian sun worship festivals. Around 3,000 B. C. pagans believed that birds were blessed because they could get closer to the sun god. Mankind couldn't catch the birds, only their eggs, which became symbols of fertility and rebirth. Sun worshippers in the region now known as Ukraine created intricately decorated eggs covered with nature symbols. They called the craft pysanky (pesonkie) and used the eggs in springtime religious ceremonies.

By 988 A. D. Ukrainians adopted Christianity, and decorated eggs took on a meaning we embrace today. The eggs were used to symbolized the rebirth of Christ, incorporating Christian symbols into traditional pysanky designs.

By 1200 Christians in Mesopotamia began exchanging colored eggs during their Easter celebration. These were the first Easter eggs.

The egg is seen by followers of Christianity as a symbol of resurrection: while being dormant it contains a new life sealed within it. When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him.2And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?'4When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. (Mark 16)

In the Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches, Easter eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Christ, shed on the Cross, and the hard shell of the egg symbolized the sealed Tomb of Christ — the cracking of which symbolized His Resurrection from the dead. Easter eggs are blessed by the priest at the end of the Paschal Vigil (which is equivalent to our Holy Saturday), and distributed to the faithful. Each household also brings an Easter basket to church, filled with Easter eggs. Lynn's father was a pysanky egg artist.

Since we exchange presents at Christmas, I wonder why we don't celebrate the most important day in Christianity by exchanging symbols of the Resurrection with each other. In Latvia, breaking eggs is the aim of an Easter children's game. Competitors bang the ends of the eggs together, striking the broad end together first then the narrow end, until one player's egg breaks. The winner is the player with the stronger egg. In Romania, visitors strike red eggs against one held by the head of the household and exchange the greetings "Christ is risen!" and "He is risen indeed!" The person who keeps an unbroken egg is said to enjoy the longest life. But there is meaning beyond the popular icon and the show.

At the very least we can exchange the traditional greeting of "Christ is Risen!" because we will all experience "the longest life", eternal life with Christ our Lord.

Palm Sunday—Easter Sunday perhaps rivals Christmas, so far as demand on any Christian Church music program. Holy Comforter is no exception. The following is but a partial list of musical offerings:

Palm Sunday: Our church choir performs a new composition, "Hosannas Everywhere" by Robert Hobby. The anthem, involving participation by the congregation, tells the story of the King riding into town and the struggle of the Passion.

Maundy Thursday: The service begins with a slow rendition of "Now the Green Blade Rises" by handbell choir. The church choir leads the congregation in song, followed by "Mandatum," (I Give You a New Commandment, that you Love One Another) sung by the chamber choir.

Good Friday: This most solemn of worship experiences features Andrew Lloyd Webber's "Pie Jesu." The Latin selection features the church choir, with duet by Leslie Crist and Meredith Varn. At the conclusion of the service the church choir sings "Jesus Remember Me," followed by the closing of the book.

Easter Sunrise: The church choir will (Wake the Dead) with the Vivaldi's Easter Proclamation, "The Lord Is Arisen, The Lord Is Alive."

Easter 10:30 am Service: Solo trumpeter, Brandon McCotter, son of Leslie and John Crist, will accompany the choirs and congregation as we proclaim the Risen Christ. Easter Fanfares and Handel's, "This is the Day the Lord has Made," as well as the spiritual "Steal Away," presented by the Chamber Choir, promises to be a celebration of New Life not soon forgotten.
