

We are now beginning a study of **Holy Week** and **Easter**. The *Family Newsletter* has been mailed out. You are encouraged to make Sunday Church School an intentional part of your Lenten practice.

Beginning Wednesday, March 7 we will have evening prayer services with the focus being on The Women Witnesses. A homily will be presented each night by a different woman in our congregation who will take on the role of a Biblical woman to share the story of Jesus and how their relationship with him changed their lives. Over the course of the 5 weeks of Lent we will hear the witness of:

- Mary, Mother of our Lord
- Anna, the Prophetess
- Mary Magdalene
- ◆ The Woman at the Well
- Pilates Wife

This service will take place in the fellowship hall after the congregational meal each night. The meal time is 6:00 pm. Series begins at 6:30 pm.

Each of our Lenten Wednesdays will utilize Holden Evening Prayer written in 1985 by Marty Haugen, composer of Now The Feast and Celebration, while Marty was the musician-in-residence at Holden Village, a Lutheran retreat center in Washington state. This lovely setting of Vespers follows traditional form while using contemporary and inclusive language. Plan to join us for each service. We will begin the services at about 6:30 pm. Plan to join us even if you are just arriving for the meal.

Beginning Sunday, March 4 we begin a 4-week support group on *Grief: The Reluctant Journey*.

If you, or someone you know, is grieving the death of a loved one, you are encouraged to join us each Sunday in March at 2:00 pm in the church parlor. A 4-week commitment is required. The Auxiliary of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary

In 1934, in the midst of the Great Depression, a letter appeared in the July edition of the *North Carolina Lutheran* written by Pastor H. A. McCullough, outlining a critical financial situation that existed at Southern Seminary. This call for help awakened an impassioned response from Mary McClanahan Holland, long-time supporter of missions in the southern Lutheran church. It took another six years before a formal organization was formed but on May 20, 1940, "a large group of women, brought together by Mrs. E. C. Cooper, wife of the president of the Seminary at that time, met in the Seminary Reception Room and organized an auxiliary to be known as THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY OF THE LUTHERAN THEOLOGICAL SOUTHERN SEMINARY."

Holy Comforter's connection with our seminary auxiliary began when we proposed honoring members of our church with life membership to the auxiliary. Each life membership **OR** memorial is a \$100 donation to the auxiliary. **Beverly Reynolds and Barbara Beale** will be accepting donations on Sundays, **March 11 & 18**. From the Pastor's Desk

My first communion occurred on the day of my confirmation. It was the "reward" for completing 3 years of catechetical classes every Wednesday afternoon for 2 ½ hours with 18 other teenagers. (Taught at St. Paul's, Columbia by Pastor Shelby) Back then the classes were torture. We had to read five or six books and take tests on them, listen to what seemed like endless lectures, and, maybe worst of all, memorizing most of Luther's catechism wholesale. Then, having to stand up in front of the class and recite the memorized works. By the time I finished those 3 years, I was ready for a reward --- ANY reward.

The truth is that Holy Communion is not a reward at all, we couldn't do enough to earn it. It is a free gift of God's grace given to us to nurture us in our faith and response for Christ dying on the cross for us. More than three decades ago, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) began re-thinking the idea of making us wait until we are prepared, confirmed before we can receive this gift of grace.

The 1st Communion Class will be held Saturday, March 24 and then followed up on Sunday, March 25 at 4:00 pm. A parent or guardian MUST accompany your child to both classes.

DEADLINE for April Newsletter information and articles is March 19. Please have all information to Dianne by this date so there is time to layout, print and mail newsletter.

The church decided to begin allowing 3rd graders receive communion. Setting the bar at third grade was not arbitrary. After much study the decision was made because it was the earliest age a child could comprehend the significance, meaning, and "holiness" of this Lutheran sacrament

Now the debate is over whether or not we can withhold God's grace in the sacrament from anyone --- regardless of age. While that debate continues, we, at Holy Comforter will communion our children when they are in the 1st grade. This means that parents, like never before, will have to play a primary role in the encouragement and instruction in this vital participation of God's Holy Sacrament.

Lillian E. Lineberger Scholarship Fund

"Hot cross bun, a round bun made from a rich yeast dough containing flour, milk, sugar, butter, eggs, currants, and spices, such as cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice, and cloves. In England, hot cross buns are **traditionally eaten on Good Friday**; they are marked on top with a cross, wither cut in the dough or composed of strips of pastry. The mark is of ancient origin, connected with religious offerings of bread, which replaced earlier, less civilized offerings of blood... According to superstition, hot cross buns and loaves baked on Good Friday never went mouldy, and were sometimes kept as charms from one year to the next.
