

Grace and peace,

It took some convincing, but I joined in the excitement and anticipation and with my family drove to the middle of nowhere in SC in order to see the solar eclipse "in totality." It did not disappoint. I had only read a small amount about what the experience of a total solar eclipse would be like, so experiencing it as a surprise left me in awe. It was cloudy when the partial eclipse started, so we only got glimpses at first. As it was only a few minutes from totality the clouds parted and we were able to see it clearly. It was impressive, but even more interesting to me were the effects that it caused. In the shadows of the leaves we saw the light of the sliver of sun shining through, casting hundred if not thousands of tiny crescents of light on the ground. Then, on either side of totality we were able to "see wind" as the air turbulence made the light dance on the ground. And then the moon completely covered the sun and it was surreal and awe inspiring.

Going to see the full eclipse meant I had to put down my to-do list for a while in order to go and experience it, and while it meant making up for the time later in the week, I'm glad I did it. Because it gave me an opportunity to stand in awe of God's creativity in creation, something I do not

allow myself to do enough of, and I would assume many of us don't do as much as we ought. It was an opportunity to be amazed, to be surprised by the wonders of God's creation in a way that I haven't done in a long time, likely since seeing the Northern Lights from a canoe in the middle of a lake in Minnesota. It was wonderful and life-giving. I don't often jump up and down with excitement, but realized at one point that my feet were indeed not touching the ground.

The thing is, it shouldn't take something that happens once a decade or so for me to allow myself this opportunity. The wonders of God's creativity in creation and in God's grace working are all around us, but too often our to-do list, all of the things pulling on us that we are so anxious to get done, blind us to those things that surround us. And so I am going to work hard to recognize these moments of grace and amazement with God's Creation, including God's people. I will work to be amazed at Gabriel's curious mind as he starts kindergarten, and truly listen when he tells me about what he is learning. I will work to be amazed at moments of bravery and trusting faith as people face life-changing situations. I will work to be amazed at the beauty of relationships as I watch people greet both friends and visitors on Sunday mornings. The beauty of God's grace and action are surrounding us in every moment, and I invite you to join me as I work to put down the anxiety of my to-do lists and be amazed.

Many of you are aware that our expenses are running approximately \$14,000 above current offering. The expenses have paralleled the anticipated expenditures approved by the congregation in the budget. This is a monthly shortage of roughly \$1800. Historically, the trend during summer months is offerings are reduced, that trend has continued this summer, and has led to greater deficit than usually seen at this time.

Looking over the budget it is apparent that we are a church that continues to be diligent with the dollars with which we have been entrusted. Most of the budget is appropriated to maintain Holy Comforter's premises and support the various ministries to our congregation. Over the past few years there has been a steady increase in the budget, the largest portion of which is dedicated to helping our children grow in Christ. Other, smaller increases reflect steadily rising costs for maintenance of the property, utilities, insurance and operation of the Church's office. A modest amount is also dedicated to outreach to those in the community, and a greater commitment to the ELCA.

All of the items in Holy Comforter's budget represent our efforts as members of the Body of Christ to do His work as best we can. To this end, as we move through the second half of the centennial year, we ask that you be intentional about your commitment to financial giving to support the budget and if you might be able to help close the gap.
