This phrase seems to best describe my feelings toward the Youth Gathering.

As I reflect on the process of getting ready for the youth gathering, and all of the attention it took I can't believe that two years' worth of prep work is over. I could have never imagined that it would've been that incredible. I have never seen 31,000 people worship together, get along so easily, or being so genuine as to why they are there. I was amazed every night at Mass Gathering; the speakers were so real and the grace they shared was touching. There is no great description for how awesome it really was. I whole-heartedly believe that the Youth Gathering changes lives and our faith. The theme, "This Changes Everything" was more than a

theme, it was an expectation. Our group of 7, were funny, kind, smart, flexible, but most of all loving. I could have spent a whole other week with them. What an incredible faith forming experience!

Grace and peace,

I had a conversation with someone recently, not a member of this church, to talk about their journey of faith and where they are at this point in their life. Everyone's story is different, with their own experiences and people influencing how they see and experience God and God's grace in this world and in their lives. This person had been a part of a faith community that had very clear expectations about what members should believe, about God and about the world God made, and how people should behave because of those of beliefs. Part of me gets the appeal of this approach. We want clarity in the things that we believe. We want to know exactly what God wants of us, what we are meant to believe, and what that means for our behavior and relationships. This person was questioning some of those assumptions, however, and did not feel welcome once that happened.

The conversation I had with this person made me thankful that I am a part of the Lutheran tradition, particularly the ELCA. Not that we're inherently better than any other tradition or that we are not without our faults, but that our tradition tends to allow people room to wrestle with their faith, recognizing that there is much that remains unclear. The Apostle Paul said that, "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part: then I shall know

fully, even as I have been fully known."(1 Corinthians 13:12). Questioning and wrestling with our faith often leads to growth, both individually and for the community. It allows for people of different minds to gather together in worship and service to our neighbor, bound by the Spirit and not divided by differences. I think allowing room for questioning and healthy debate through the years has allowed our theology to become more Christ-centered and reflective of God's love.

It's not that our faith isn't founded in anything, of course. Martin Luther wrote a Large and Small Catechism to teach both laity and clergy about their faith. The Book of Concord is a compiling of Luther and other early Lutheran theologians that our church claims as a faithful exposition of our faith. The ELCA has numerous Social Statements, developed through prayerful conversations and voted on by the Churchwide Assembly, that we use as teaching documents. And of course all of these things lean heavily on scripture, the norm of our faith, and our clearest revelation of God's redemptive love for the world in Christ Jesus.

We have been doing a bit of brainstorming between staff and individuals who have voiced opinions on a variety of topics. At the top of the list is the children's ensemble. For some time we have met at 4:00 on Sundays throughout the school year. For a number of years we actually met, successfully I might add, prior to Sunday school.

I would like to propose that we consider trying this again. While 4:00 seems to be good for many, some folks are unable to make an additional trip to the church on Sunday afternoon. Some positive aspects of this schedule is that: (1) It requires no return afternoon trip...(2) It allows for a smooth transition into the Sunday school hour...(3) children will be able to adequately prepare for anthems or whatever worship activity may be presented on a given Sunday. Feel free to contact me regarding age range. Some children are able to sing at earlier ages than others, and some older children may desire staying in the group and functioning as leaders and assistants.

There are not a lot of schedule choices if we eliminate school nights, Sunday afternoons and certainly Saturday is not an option. With this all in mind I would like to propose that we consider the following two best options:

1. Sunday mornings 8:45-9:30

Try it for a 12-week commitment and reevaluate.

2. Leave things as they are at 4:00 on Sundays.

NOTE: Neither of these scenarios would begin until after Labor Day.

These are very special children and I would love to see them more actively participate in the worship life of the church, as well as in the life of our extended community. Please prayerfully consider encouraging your child to participate. Please send me feedback. We need everyone to have a voice!
