
and milestones. I hope as Holy C grows so does our engagement within our church and outside of our church. My prayer for this year is for us to continue to grow deeper to grow wider.

January brings the holiday season to an end.

From Thanksgiving to New Years, we are in this season of festive parties, Christmas music in every store and half the radio channels, and extravagant and often nostagic meals. It is the season of Hallmark movies, where most folks want their lives to look like them, at least for a time, though it almost never actually does. In truth I don't particularly love Hallmark movies, though I don't blame people who do. They are feel-good movies, and Lord knows we need as much "feel-good" as we can get these days. One of the things in the movies that I often roll my eyes at is that many of them have a romantic plot line, and somewhere in it is this idea that the two people are "made for each other." The story is written in such a way that the viewer knows this in the first ten minutes, but the characters don't until the last five, and it's just not a plot that interests me much, so I do the typical guy thing and roll my eyes and poke fun at it.

But throughout this holiday season the idea of people being "made for each other" has been on my mind a good bit. Granted, not so much in terms of romantic relationships, but in terms of how all people are created for each other. We are created not to be islands on our own, but created to be in community, to be in relationships with each other. The holidays are a time that I am reminded of that.

I am reminded of that when things are good, as we watch friends and family gather together at bad sweater parties, neighbors hang out and play in the snow together, as folks share meals of abundance with one another, as friends and strangers gather for New Years celebrations, and as a church family we gather together for Christmas plays, parties, meals, and worship. The holidays, while hectic themselves, can be a time when we stop with the daily hustle and bustle of life and focus on re-

lationships with those closest to us as well as the neighbor we haven't yet met.

I am also reminded that we are made for each other when things are hard. I watched from up close and afar as people for whom holidays are hard, who have lost loved ones, wrestle with broke relationships, struggle with finances, have been embraced and lifted up by others through meals, invitations, a shared sentiment, an embrace, or simply being present with them as they struggle. We were made for each other. God made us for community, for loving relationships. And in a recent conversation I was reminded how important it is for us to remember Christ's presence in one another. Because as the Body of Christ, as we celebrate with our neighbor, or as we walk with those who struggle. we are Christ for one another. Our acts of kindness, our loving embrace of another, our presence, is the very presence Christ reaching out to them, and Christ in them for us. I give thanks to God that we were made for each other, and for Christ's presence in you.
