I grew up in a neighborhood that had a decent amount of kids around my age. When it gets close to summer time and kids start get out of

school I often think back on that time in my life. We lived only eight or so blocks from downtown Salisbury, and for years a handful of us would almost daily hop on our bikes, round the corner, toss our helmets into a bush to pick up later so our parents thought we were wearing them, and spend the day at our local soccer store, eating hotdogs from Hap's Grill and Ice Cream from Spanky's. We played all sorts of sports in "the field" around the corner from our houses, which I've since realized was barely more than an empty lot that was not at all flat, but it was all we needed. It was a fairly carefree and joyful time of my life, not better than now, but certainly with less responsibility and stress. And most of these days started with one of us kids showing up at another's house, knocking on the door and asking, "Can come out and play?"

As we grow older we are taught to become very task-oriented. Both at home and at work I have to-do lists that never get cleared out, with something always hanging over me and making me feel like I haven't been productive enough. As a faith community we fall victim to this as well, feeling like any time we spend together must be very task-oriented, with a clear purpose and goal. Otherwise it doesn't seem valuable enough to get us to show up when there are plenty of other things on our to-do lists to accomplish. And this task-oriented approach has us not looking for many opportunities to play together.

My family went on the Isle of Palms retreat again this year, and it was a wonderful reminder that we need to play together, to have time together when we are not working to accomplish a task, or having any real sort of expectation on one another.

Sitting on a beach with no agenda but keeping the kids alive and sun screened provides great opportunity for unprompted conversations and sharing with one another about our lives, not to mention create shared stories. Playing cards or boardgames together gives us a chance to play and laugh together. Since the trip, I've heard a number of people talk about how much they enjoyed someone there that they hadn't known well beforehand, because they hadn't spent time around them. It has ben a wonderful reminder of our need to play together, and how play has a powerful ability to bind us to one another. There is a lot of work to be done, surely, but we cannot forget the importance of play for our own sake, and for community.

Recently, I've been noticing that a LOT of folks (myself included!) have been suffering symptoms of seasonal allergies – sneezing, itchy eyes, runny noses, etc. According to the folks who

watch the pollen counts, the counts have been extremely high this season and even folks who've never suffered before are suffering now. Here are a few hints to help you cope with seasonal allergies:

Pollen. Check the pollen counts with the local weather station. Generally, pollen counts are worse in the early morning and on windy days. Take these steps to minimize exposure:

- Have someone else do your yard work while you stay inside with the windows closed.
- If you have to work outside, wear a face mask.
- Leave all gardening tools including clothing - outdoors, and shower immediately after working outdoors.
- Plant low-allergenic grasses, trees and shrubs. Generally, flowering plants that rely on insect pollination are best, since their pollen are too large and heavy to become airborne.

Molds. If you're allergic to molds, avoid areas and items that harbor them, including:

- Moist, shady areas outdoors, garden compost piles, and greenhouses.
- Damp basements and closets, bathrooms, places where fresh food is stored, air conditioners, humidifiers, garbage pails, mattresses, upholstered furniture and old foam rubber pillows.
- Open a window or use a fan after a steamy shower or bath, to allow the humidity to escape.

Dust Mites. The best way to reduce exposure to dust mites is to reduce the dust in your home:

- Consider replacing wall-to-wall carpeting with wood, laminate, vinyl or tile floors.
- Use a vacuum cleaner equipped with a HEPA filter.
- Dust mites are most prevalent in the bedroom, so attack that room first. Remove blinds, down-filled blankets and feather pillows. Encase your bedding in zippered, plastic, airtight covers and wash all sheets and bedding weekly in the hottest water available.

Animals. All pets cause allergies, even Chihuahuas and so-called "hairless" cats. But, if you simply can't bear to find another home for your pet:

- Have someone else bathe your pet weekly and brush it outdoors several times a week.
- Use a room air purifier.
- Wear a face mask while cleaning house.
- Wash your hands after touching or handling your pet to avoid spreading the dander.
- Keep pets out of your bedroom.

While it's impossible to avoid airborne allergens entirely, implementing these things can greatly reduce their affect on you and your family. Of course, if things get unbearably out of control for you, seek help

from your doctor as to what medication regime you may need to use. Good news is that the seasonal types of allergens should be nearly done popping out and soon settle down!





Hard to believe that half the year is nearly behind us. Discovering what some wiser folks have told me over the years..."Time moves faster the older you get." How true!

I was pondering a bit again about our past 100 Years. What is even more amazing is that 30 years ago this congregation was in the midst of a very ambitious campaign to replace our failing pipe organ. We stepped out in faith and raised nearly \$250,000.00 to acquire the world class instrument that has served us since that time. There were a number of firsts, including engaging the assistance of a foundation who guided us through the giving process. This was, after all, a bigger financial decision than was the actual construction of the church site in the 1950s.

Gifts and pledges began arriving. One retired member canceled her newspaper subscription and gave those funds toward the project, another couple gave a used car to the youth of the church. The vehicle was sold by the youth and proceeds given to the cause. Other members gave gifts from wills and estates, and vacant land. All this is to simply say that it taught us to not be afraid to take that leap of financial faith. We were a congregation at that time who had been debt free for 25 years, and were very comfortable with just making the annual budget. And, by the way, this same pipe organ in today's dollars... \$900.000.00.

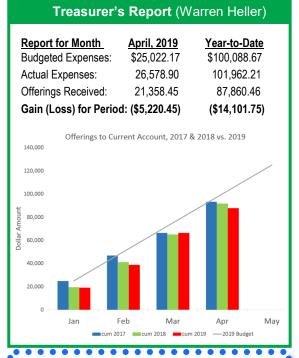
