

Holy Comforter Treasurer Report

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during July was \$5,446.51. The year-todate deficit, through July 31, was \$15,260.72. Year-to-date spending, curtailed because of the pandemic, is \$28,138.36 below the amount planned in the 2020 budget. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses during July was \$17,050.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month is \$25,281.08. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

Financial Stewardship

Abundant thanks are due for the continued faithfulness of so many members of Holy Comforter throughout this time of Pandemic in supporting the finances of the church. While we are losing money each month, we are in a much better financial situation than many other churches due to the faithfulness of members in their giving and handling of funds before this time, and the continued efforts through this time. We have had continued giving in support of our current expenses, as well as in our benevolence that supports people and ministries in need beyond our congregation.

- 9. Pay no attention to destructive remarks and personal attacks on you. Live so that no one will believe them. Remember, a common cause of backbiting is dissatisfaction with oneself.
- 10. Don't be concerned about your "just due." Do a good turn for the sake of being helpful.

But, until then, practice the dos and don'ts of a good relationship as we connect from afar! And remember...at least for now... it's an elbow bump, not a hug!

Grace and peace,

It became apparent in the National Conventions of the two main political parties that faith will be a part of the debates and discussions that take place between now and

Election Day in November. Both candidates claim to be people of Christian faith, both claim to be led by their faith, and both have people of strong faith convictions supporting them. Which means faith and religion will be wrapped up in the political debates over the next few months. Which means faith and religion will be weaponized over the next few months, and something that we believe calls us to love one another and is healing for Creation will be used as a tool to drive us apart. Seeing that coming, I want to lift up a few points as we potentially wrestle with this.

The first point is that these politicians and political debates do not define your faith or your religion. While they will want you to pick a side as they claim theirs is the faithful party, another option is to reject the premise. Our faith should absolutely influence the way we vote, with our vote doing more than helping ourselves but also advocating for the vulnerable in society, but we should not let political parties with obvious motives dictate how our faith should move us to vote. Question their assumptions about your faith and what they think it means about you. If something doesn't feel right to you, talk to me or a person of faith you look up to and we can wonder about these things together.

If you're interested in what the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) says about a number of the hot button issues that will be brought up at some point throughout the election cycle you can look at ELCA.org for the Social Statements. They cover a variety of issues like Care for Creation, Criminal Justice, Abortion, Health Care, Death Penalty, and more. Some of them are a number of years old and in need of some updating, but they will show some faithful and scripturally founded ways to think through these issues from a Lutheran perspective.

One thing that I have appreciated about the ELCA as I have grown up in it and become a pastor in it is that there is room for wrestling. While I've spoken with people kicked out of other churches for questioning and wrestling with issues, the ELCA has often been a place where this has been encouraged. Within our own congregation we have a breadth of perspectives and stances which only widens as we move to the ELCA on a state and national level. I appreciate this because it allows me to struggle while knowing that I have a place where I am welcome, where I will not be cast out for questioning and doubting and ultimately growing in my faith. I also appreciate this because I think it is a wonderful witness to the world that even when we disagree on a wide range of topics, we believe the love of Christ

which binds us together is bigger than all of those things. That is an important witness in the world these days.

And remember that your faith is from God, a gift of the Spirit. May it be a gift that is used not to tear down, but to share the love and grace of God and bring healing to the world.

Discipleship Academy Where Learning Becomes Faithfully Personal.

New Confirmation Program!

We are excited to offer a new confirmation program this year! Inspired by meetings Beka had with leaders throughout the synod, Beka and Pastor Micah are working to offer a curriculum that looks much different than before. Students will need to acquire 16 total credits in order to be confirmed, with 8 credits coming from required classes and 8 coming from optional classes. The hope is this will give students a good foundation of our faith tradition while also allowing them to experiment with unique ways they may want to live out their faith as they become an adult in the church. The credits will come from

a mixture of podcasts, classes on specific subjects (currently offered online but will be in-person when possible), retreats, camp, worship volunteering, music offerings, community engagement, and more. Beka has developed a website to support the program, and they will have a new topic to engage each month.
