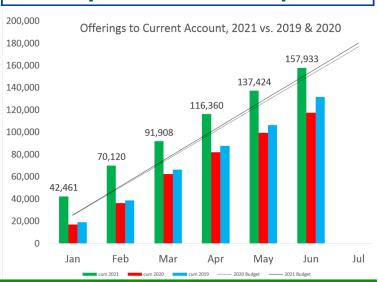


Treasurer's Report for June 2021

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during June was \$3,822.14. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$20,509.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2021 is \$25,767.00.

Year-to-date spending, through June 30, was \$12,765.37 below the amount planned in the 2021 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

Summertime Safety

In the summertime, it is easy to just "go with the flow" when we picnic or vacation. It is at those times when we let down our guard that accidents hap-

pen. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, more than 3.7 million consumers have made unplanned trips to their hospitals' emergency departments ... in just one summer!

We often hear safety tips and warnings in regard to swimming, biking, hiking, picnicking, swimming, etc., and it can be easy to tune them out, thinking, "Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. I've heard this before! I'm careful!" So ... I'd like to devote this month's article to safety issues you may not have heard before!

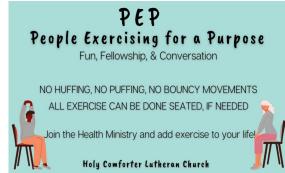
- If the outside temperature is 85° or higher, discard all food that has been sitting out for an hour. If the temperature is under 85°, throw it away after 2 hours.
- Never bring charcoal grills indoors [garage]. Burning charcoal produces deadly carbon monoxide.
- Create three safety layers around your swimming pool a fence, an alarm, and an eagle-eyed adult!
- Children who are not licensed to drive a car should not be allowed to operate off-road vehicles. They are particularly dangerous for children younger than 16 years who may have immature judgment and less developed motor muscle skills.
- A cushion of at least 9" of wood chips should be distributed under playground

equipment to serve as a shock absorber for falls.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends, "communities continue to develop skateboard parks, which are more likely to be monitored for safety than ramps and jumps constructed by kids at home."

Finally, I cringe whenever I drive by a home that has a trampoline in the yard! In fact AAP does not recommend the use of home trampolines. Children and adults are sustaining injuries, which range from sprains and strains to broken necks, head, and spinal cord injuries. Kids 15 and under account for twothirds of all trampoline injuries, and almost 75% of all injuries involved more than one person being on the equipment at one time. According to the University of Michigan C. S. Mott Children's Hospital even adult supervision is not always adequate. Spotters need to be big enough and strong enough to protect the jumper if he/she gets too close to the edge. Though it can be a lot of fun, perhaps this is a piece of equipment better left to professional gymnasts.

FROM THE PASTOR

This past year has seen our worship opportunities on Sunday mornings jump from one to five, with a current ability to worship in the sanctuary, outdoors twice a month, in the fellowship hall, in the parking lot, and streaming online. We're posting children's sermons and adult faith formation videos online, we've held meetings, bible studies, and lunch fellowship over zoom. I am immensely thankful for all of the technology that has

allowed us to worship, fellowship, and study together during this chaotic and challenging time. The truth is that we're never going back to a pre-pandemic world, many folks within the church believe the pandemic just sped along a reality that was already happening in terms of church life happening in part online, and certainly streaming worship is here to stay for the long run.

But I am finding myself pretty traditional in that I still believe that as the church we are better when we're together. Online worship and involvement will continue to be a blessing and a wonderful option when folks are homebound, have health concerns, are distant and unable to be present, and again, I am thankful for them, but there is an intimacy in relationship, a connection to our sisters and brothers, and often a deeper faith experience, that happens when we are able to be present. We join together in communal prayer, join voices in song and praise, share with and support one another before and after, and sometimes during, worship in ways that are hard to recreate online.

I think the biblical story supports this as well. While there was no internet in biblical times, at times God chose to speak through prophets and angels, or through visions and dreams. God was certainly very involved in the lives of God's people, still sustaining all creation, but also sometimes viewed as distant. The time God felt—closest to God's people, and in turn the time—when God's love—became most clear to us, was when Jesus Christ was born into he world, incarnated, bodily present in the world. Christ was able to touch and heal, feed the hungry, sit down for shared meals with followers and sinners alike, able to wash the feet of the disciples, and tragically though graciously crucified and raised. God has always been present with God's people, but the way in which we most intimately and clearly were made aware of that abiding presence, love, and grace was in the bodily presence of Jesus Christ. Even now, the two places were are most clearly promised to encounter Christ have a physical element to them, in the sacraments of baptism and holy communion.

Being able to worship from home is a wonderful gift, especially during this time, and as we continue to wrestle with health concerns and the anxieties of being in group settings, or whatever your rationale might be, I don't want to make anyone feel guilty for choosing to worship in this way. It is good, and I am thankful for it for so many reasons. However, I still believe we are better when we are together, better able to experience Christ in community worship, better able to be in good relationship with our sisters and

brothers, better able to work together for the sake of the world.

So please take care of yourselves, whatever that looks like for you in these times. And if you're able, as we relearn patterns and routines, find ways to join in community as we join in worship and mission in Christ's name, be that indoors, outdoors, or in the parking lot and able to roll down the window and wave and speak to others and visit around worship. We're better when we're together.

COVID PROTOCOL UPDATES
