Each Wednesday in November the youth handbells practiced for the midweek worships in December.






Treasurer's Report for October 2021

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during October was \$1,417.03. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$22,160.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2021 is \$25,767.00. Year-to-date spending, through October 31, was \$20,934.53 below the amount planned in the 2021 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.




Prime Timers Bible Study

Grace and Peace,

Time has always operated in strange ways, moving more quickly than seemingly possible at times, and standing almost completely still at others. I'm pretty sure places like the DMV gave CS Lewis the idea for Narnia, because you enter inside and feel like you've spent a lifetime there, but you leave only moments later. The pandemic has seemed to exacerbate the oddities of time for me, seeming to have been going on forever at this point, while also time speeding by. For instance, if it weren't for the planning and preparation we've had to do, I wouldn't believe you if you told me Advent was upon us.

Even more than most years, Advent seems like the season of the church year we need right now. Advent itself seems to exist in two different times. All it was it is a season that looks back and remembers a time while also looking forward in anticipation of another. For most folks, Advent is a season that is a countdown to Christmas, to a celebration of Christ's birth into the world. That is one appropriate view of Advent. We remember stories of anticipation of the messiah's birth and ministry as we, ourselves, anticipate the joyful celebration of the Incarnation, of God being born among us and with us. Along with remembering, however, is the anticipation in our own times, waiting for the time when Christ comes again to bring the kingdom to fruition in our world. Advent is a season existing in two times because all at once we look back and look forward.

Advent is perhaps the season we most need right now because in challenging times, with divisions at a boiling point and relationships strained, with our nation's resiliency put to the test, with environmental news seeming dire, it is a reminder to us that the best is still ahead for us.

That does not mean that challenging times aren't part of our future as well, but with the promise that Christ will bring God's kingdom to fruition on earth, and knowing that we have not fully experienced that yet, we know that the best, the kingdom, is ahead for us. Advent is a season of hope because it is a reminder that God is with us in Emmanuel as we wait to celebrate the birth of Christ which made that true for us, and it is a reminder that the best is yet to come.

For Christians, it is perfectly faithful to remember good times when we experience the love and grace of God through times of peace or joy, through relationships that were life-giving and Christ-revealing, but I don't know that it is faithful to want to go back to any point in our history, because the best, the kingdom, is ahead of us. Advent is a season of hope, and hope is a wonderful gift to give these days.
