Holy Comforter Youth (HCY) is for 6 th -12 th graders. We meet the first three Sundays of the month at 5 pm. We eat, we play games, and then we do a bible study. Last year we started the year off with a bible study on belonging. We used the Body of Christ scripture from 1 Corinthians and a reading from Acts about believers in community. The point of this bible study is to build a covenant and then reinforce it by naming that we all inherently belong to this group.

This year I decided that we would do a series on belonging. We would take the first half of the year to study what that means. We all have inherent value and belong, and what does the bible say about it. We are studying and dwelling in themes of community, unity, inclusivity, loyalty, hospitality, teamwork, and invitation, as ideas of belonging. The first week of this study, we do two things.

The first is we build a covenant; we write down words that we promise to live into in the youth room and out of the youth room. Our youth rewrite this covenant every year, and this year's words were caring, forgiveness, equal opportunity, dignity, supportive, inclusivity, kind ness, listen, and helpfulness. So, when we fail at practicing these important words, we are reminded that we can try again.

During this same week, we define what belonging means to us. Our youth define belonging as being wanted. togetherness, everyone being welcome no matter who they are, being friendly, being a part of something, and community. These are some big words our youth have put together and we pray to get better at acknowledging people's natural belonging. Some of these special definitions, I have seen our youth live out. They support one another when we do bible studies. They listen to one another during group discussion. While we have a lot to learn. we are well on our way to living faithfully and loving our neighbors.



Treasurer's Report for September 2022



Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during September was \$4,869.69. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$20.056.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2022 is \$26,222.00. The year-to-date deficit, through September 30, was \$28,493.93. Year-to-date spending was \$17,993.57 below the amount planned in the 2022 budget. The

adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

In mid-October I gathered with a number of rostered leaders for our conference lunch (we are in the Mecklenburg Conference). We shared a good bit about the joys and struggles of ministry these days. It was helpful for me to hear that the trends we've been experiencing are not unique to us, no matter the size congregation, particularly when it comes to worship

numbers and participation. As we talked together it became pretty clear to me that, while some people just got out of the habit, for a lot of people the struggle has to do as much or more with grief. Remember the 5 stages of grief: Denial, Anger, Bargaining, Depression, and Acceptance. I've seen all of these stages at work over the past few years including now. We think about grief primarily when it comes to a person's death, but grief can happen whenever there is a loss of any kind, and we have a lot to grieve, frankly, individually and as a community. The general trend is that churches are experiencing around 60% of the attendance that they had before the pandemic began, and that tracks about right for us. For folks who were here in 2019 or before, that means the sanctuary doesn't feel as full as it used to, and that is something they grieve. Perhaps the folks they felt closest to are some of the ones who aren't here, and those relationships in this place are something they grieve.

Even the things that have continued perhaps look different, and one program that has been around and life-giving for decades that we've struggled with is Sunday School. When we brought it back in the Spring we struggled to get people to participate, and even after a survey that got responses saying people wanted it and would participate, we've had very little participation. I think the idea of not having it would cause grief. Leadership is now talking about letting that program go if our participation levels continue so we're not investing so much time, energy, and volunteer participation, in a program that people aren't opting into. That's a hard thing to say from a pastor who grew up in these programs and was formed by them, and knowing how dear those times have been for so many here. However, sometimes in order for resurrection and new life to happen, we cannot be afraid to let some things die.

This article might seem like a downer to this point, sorry about that, but let me end by saying that I do believe that new life and resurrection is not only possible, but happening at Holy Comforter. While Sunday school has dropped off, we've been more intentional with our children's church time and kids are getting a lot out of this intentional 20 minutes each week. Our Kid's Club time has been reoriented to not only be time to play, but also time for faith formation, because that's when we have kids showing up. HCY continues to be fruitful for community and faith formation for youth, and our kids are engaging the new Confirmation program in ways they never did in the previous program. With adults we've had deep and vibrant conversations in Book Club, Prime Timers, and Women's Bible Study, and our Small Groups have now kicked off. In no

way have we abandoned Faith Formation, it is just happening in new ways as people engage differently and we try to meet folks where they are. And in worship, we have anywhere from 1/3 of our participants online, to sometimes more online than in the room. While I continue to think we are at our best when we're together and in relationship, our reach is much wider than it once was, and we're responding to trends in new ways with online engagement. Even in a pandemic time we've had new members join because God is at work in this place!

There are certainly things we've lost worth grieving, individually and as a community, but as we process that grief we should not let it keep us from seeing the ways that God's faithfulness continues to be constant, to breathe new life into places of grief, and to invite us to participate in God's work to extend that work into the world.

From Greg Cline, MD (Music Director)




