April is much about Easter, but we of course are still in the middle of the Lenten Season. I can't tell you how much time is involved from our volunteer music ministers to make the musical offerings here at Holy Comforter look and sound as seamless as they do. The youth handbell ensemble has been accompanying the Wednesday evening prayer services of worship. Although half of that group are first time ringers, they have done a wonderful job.

The church choir has full responsibility each week of leading the assembly in song. While 90% of our weekly hours together involve preparation of the offertory anthems, that is but a few moments of the worship hour. If the choir director is ever guilty of preaching to the choir, it is in attempting to instill the importance of each individual voice. Each one is equal in contribution to the quality of sound. Is that not similar to us as a church, the body of Christ? All individual members bringing together their unique gifts in order for the body to function.

Our handbell and chamber ensembles will also be contributing musical offerings in the coming weeks and into the Easter Season. We so appreciate the gifts of time and talent that all of our choir members give to the Glory of God. As you are given the opportunity, offer a "thank you" for their leadership.

Well, our "New" pipe organ in the back gallery is now in it's 30th year. While it is not the largest pipe organ in the state, or even in the town of Belmont, it has led us in song since the installation in 1992. The majority of our membership

may not be aware that we engaged in conversation for nearly 10 years before purchase. The biggest concern, "how do we pay for it." During the fund raising campaign we were cautioned that musical instruments, such as a pipe organ, were not without risk. Most people relate more to brick and steel, seeing dirt being moved, buildings rising from beneath the earth.

This church family rallied and payed off the loan note ahead of schedule. The pastor had to announce a plea to the congregation, "please do not give any more money to the organ fund, it's paid for." Today this same instrument is insured for nearly a million dollars. The original cost was roughly 25% of that amount. In the coming months you may hear more stats of interest on our King of Instruments.

Treasurer's Report for February 2022

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during February was \$4,571.57. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$17,445.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2022 is \$26,222.00. The year-to-date surplus, through February 28, was \$105.41. Year-to-date spending was \$7,203.41 below the amount planned in the 2022 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

Do you know how the date for Easter is set? Easter Sunday is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. Simple, right? Easter can move a good bit and be as early as March 22nd and as late as April 25th. The church

year shifts a bit, with longer or shorter seasons of Epiphany and the Season after Pentecost, depending on when Easter falls.

This will be my eighth Easter at Holy Comforter, and while I haven't started preparing a sermon for it yet, I can assume it will be like the last few where I try to figure out how to preach about resurrection in a way that doesn't sound like all my other Easter sermons. Easter is about resurrection, about new life, so each Easter we read about an empty tomb and God's victory over death in Jesus' resurrection.

But Easter isn't just about one resurrection. It is that in that one resurrection we learn that we have a God who works resurrections, who is about new life all the time. We believe that we will all experience resurrection like Christ's at some point down the line, a bodily resurrection that raises us to new life, but if we only look for resurrection in the future, something we will experience "one day" then we miss out on a lot of God's work. God is about resurrection now, bringing new life from death now. In some ways it is the way God has patterned the world. We look around in Spring and see blossoms and leaves budding on trees and plants that weeks ago looked dead. Some of us feel like death because of the pollen, but we will be resurrected on rainy days when it gets knocked down, or by Zyrtec, or the plants calm down a bit.

To be honest, most of us have been waiting for a resurrection of some kind or another. This pandemic has been hard, and even now when things are returning to a semblance of normalcy, it seems like there continues to be an exhaustion that keeps us from fully engaging. We're tired. We're tired of worrying, we're tired of adjusting, we're tired of fighting with each other. The pandemic has been far from the only thing happening over these past couple of years, but it has been the lens that we've seen most things through. We're ready for resurrection, for new life, not only in terms of schedules and logistics but also in terms of our energy levels, our willingness to commit to things, our anxiety of being around crowds again.

An important but often glossed over aspect of resurrection is that it is not simply a return to the old life. When Jesus was resurrected his body was changed. He walked through walls and locked doors, appeared over distances, was sometime recognizable but also able to be hidden,

and yet still had the scars of crucifixion. That is what we are working to claim ourselves, a life that has many of the characteristics of old ones, one that does not deny the hardships we've been through and may have scars, yet one that claims new life, has new patterns and characteristics that are life-giving and meet our needs now. Holy Comforter's schedule is a bit lighter at the moment in part because our members are still a bit tired and anxious from the past couple of years, but we are also hard at work behind the scenes, planning and strategizing for what this resurrection, new life, will look like. I give thanks that we have a God of resurrection, and I'm excited for what that will look like here.
