Treasurer's Report for July 2022

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during July was \$2920.68. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$22,010.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2022 is \$26,222.00. The year-to-date deficit, through July 31, was \$16.545.80. Year-to-date

spending was \$16,984.20 below the amount planned in the 2022 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

the rainbow through the rain, and feel the promise is not vain that morn shall tearless be.



Courtyard Project Update



Grace and Peace,

This month we launch into our faith formation programming at Holy Comforter, including two new programs for adults. In a previous newslet-

ter I talked about my hope for small groups, that they would be small communities in which folks could find accompaniment, deeper relationships, and could think about how their faith and life work together as those relationships are centered in devotion and prayer. Our other program we're starting up this year is the book study that will happen seasonally. Book studies are a chance for folks to dive deeper into certain aspects of our faith than we might be able to in our everyday lives. Reading in a group can sometimes feel inconvenient, slowing our reading in some cases, or in other forcing us to read when we feel we don't have time. It also can be an incredible gift that allows us to wrestle with new ideas in safe places, with folks who care about us, where we can bounce ideas around and hear how others have experienced the reading. We have a number of ideas of books to dig into, but we're starting out this month by reading The Book of Forgiving by Desmond Tutu and his daughter, Mpho.

I actually started reading this book recently myself because of a combination of providing pastoral care to someone struggling with forgiveness, as well as myself thinking through a situation in my own life and what forgiveness might look like there. As I've been reading it I have regularly thought how this book would be good for just about anyone. Forgiveness is a core aspect of our faith, both that we receive forgiveness from God and that we offer it to others as we continue God's work of reconciliation in the world. Yet, as integral as it is to our lives of faith, it is something we continue to struggle with, both in enacting and in understanding. Archbishop Tutu and his daughter, the Reverend Mpho Tutu, give wonderful insight on forgiveness that is grounded both in their faith and in their life experiences. They offer paths of forgiveness, showing that it is not something we do in a moment but something that we work for, both for the perpetrator of the wrong as well as for ourselves. They speak of the good of forgiveness whether the relationship is meant to be reconciled or released. They make forgiveness seem possible when we have, perhaps, felt like we're drowning in our resentment and the ways someone has harmed us and didn't know a way forward.

Each week we'll read a chapter or more of the book and then come together to talk about what we've read, how we experienced it, and how we might be able to use it. It is possible this will bring up some challenging experiences for folks, so no one is required to share beyond their comfort, but I believe the work of forgiveness is necessary for us to claim the fullness of life that God wants for us and continue the ministry of reconciliation that we've been given in Christ's name. Come be a part of this time together!
