# **Treasurer's Report for December 2022**

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during December was \$4,777.97. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$22,251.00. The budget estimate of the 250,000 amount needed each month in 2022 is \$26,222.00. The full-year deficit, through December 31, was \$36,217.03. Year-to-date spending was \$20.918.47 below the amount planned in the 2022 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

Many folks lose track of the date of the month, or even the day of the week, especially during the past couple of years when routines and schedules get altered and disrupted. This is often the case in the music ministry. For example, the church choirs are always working on anthem material months ahead of time. As a rule, I tend to believe that God is at work in everything going on, whether that means God is guiding things entirely, or weaving God's grace into certain moments to give us what we need to get through them. But often when you're in the moment it is hard to say specifical-

ly what things are God's work and will lead to good, and where God might be waiting to help bring redemption to hard situations. As you continually see God at work in certain situations, it becomes easier to believe in the moment that God is at work. One of those places, for me, is with our congregational council and its leadership. Throughout my time here, eight and a half years so far, we have had a number of people rotate through council and be our council presidents. It becomes apparent to me that it is by the grace of God that those people have had the gifts and skills needed to face the issues of the day. We have had people with hearts for stewardship, particularly of gifts and talents, people with administration skills, emotional intelligence to care well, people with long histories in the church and new ideas not bound by "the way we've always done it." As the pandemic began and was in its height, along with our then-parish nurse, Teresa Keller, we had two members who worked in public health with writing policies and communication who were able to help us move through that time as responsibly as possible, making us one of the best equipped church councils in the state for a time such as this. In particular, as I look at the council presidents over my time I have seen God at work in bringing people to leadership best equipped for their time of service. When I was called to Holy Comforter, Tim Baker was council president, someone with a long history at Holy Comforter and an ability to provide clarity in transition. Will Howard was the next council president, and served in a time the church needed a lot of work done on our property and buildings, leading the rebuilding of our HVAC work as well as a new roof on the sanctuary. And then after Will, Julia Gunter, who did not know that she was agreeing to serve through the pandemic, the first time the more than 100 year old congregation wasn't able to gathering for worship for an extended period of time. And yet Julia is a person of great integrity, who earns the trust of others well, an important quality through a time when people were questioning almost everyone's intentions and actions, and helped us move through the pandemic much more peacefully than many other congregations I know. God has certainly been at work through the leadership of this congregation in my time here, and I feel certain long before I was called here.


