

Treasurer's Report for November 2022

Treasurer's Report for November 2022 0,000 Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) 0,000 during November was \$4,002.88. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$20,725.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2022 is \$26,222.00. The year-to-date deficit, through November 30, was \$31,446.73. 0.000 Year-to-date spending was \$21,717.77 below the amount planned in the 2022 0,000 budget. The adjacent chart compares this year's offering income, by month, with that of the two previous years. This and last year's budget tracks are also presented in the graph.

Grace and peace,

There are a lot fewer traditions associated with New Year's compared the Christmas Season we just went through. The folks my family often spends New Year's with have cucumber sandwiches and a brandy drink every year, folks often watch the ball drop in Times Square, and many people make New Year's resolutions, promising themselves they'll make changes for the better in this new year. While the cynical assumption is that most people don't follow through with their resolutions, the work of introspection to discern ways to be a better person is a good practice. It isn't all that different from our work of repentance, really. Remember that repentance isn't necessarily about guilt, but more about turning and choosing a new way, God's way. Over this past year, as things open up after the pandemic, one area that our council has decided to choose a new way relates to stewardship of ourselves, our time, talent, and money, for the ministry at Holy Comforter. We are setting goals for engagement in all sorts of areas and will work to connect people to ways they can use their gifts. Unless I am mistaken, the most uncomfortable part of that will be around the topic of money. I know, a taboo subject, an uncomfortable topic. Holy Comforter was formed as church in a mill town with both mill workers and mill owners as devoted members. That reality created a culture of how we financially supported the church and talked about money. As Belmont has changed over the years, transitioning from a mill town to a bedroom community for Charlotte, though without losing its charm, Holy Comforter's characteristics have changed as well, though without losing our charm. As I've talked with folks with a history in this church, they've described a culture in which we didn't talk much about money. We've discerned that this is a place where we need to choose a new way, and have a culture shift with how we talk about money, both as it relates to church finances and support, and perhaps more importantly how our money relates to discipleship and responding to God's grace with gratitude and generosity. This year council has decided to work with other churches in the synod in a program called Stewardship for All Seasons that will help with our culture shift, our New Years Resolution of sorts. They will help us tell the story of what Christ is doing through Holy Comforter and how that is a ministry worth supporting with our time, our spiritual gifts, and our money. We're excited for this work that will take place throughout the year and beyond to help us not just change a behavior or reach a goal, but create a change in culture that is sustainably for us.






