We read the chapter about this question and by the end of the session we were left unsatisfied and challenged. What do we do when there aren't clear answers to our questions?




We talked about time, and how God lives outside of time, and no one created God, God has always been. Yet that answer, wasn't enough. So, I sent

We dwelt on the idea of freewill and how it felt like permission to choose God. Elise Bansen continued the conversation about how it was comforting to know that when we mess up God still loves us and forgives us. Holy questions, holy wondering, and holy conversations are happening upstairs. What a gift it is to be able to gather and talk about God and how God works in our lives. It's a special place to gather in the youth room and listen to how young people live their faith and wrestle with our faith in God. Those conversations don't happen without giggles and tangents, and God is in that too.

All of our ensembles are busy with preparation for our Lenten, Holy Week, and Easter services of worship. It is always a fulfilling time as we all are called to be busy about the work of the Christ's Kingdom. Of course during Lent we focus a bit more on simplicity and repetition, adopting a "less is more" approach. For example, the repeated refrain such as "Remember that you are dust...and to dust you shall return," is especially poignant during our recent imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. References to "Alleluia" are given up until the Glorious Easter Morning.

For the month of March we will be utilizing the service liturgy "Holden Evening Prayer." Composer Marty Haugen originally wrote this service of worship during the winter of 1986 while on retreat at Holden Village in the North Cascade mountains of Washington State. At Holy Comforter we have traditionally used this liturgy during the season of Lent, which is lead by clergy, choir, keyboard, and handbell instrumentation. The congregation and choir are seated together in the front half of the Nave. This brief service offers pilgrims the opportunity for contemplation and prayerful reflection for what Christ has done and continues to do for us. Invite your family and friends to experience and participate with us each Wednesday @ 6:45 during the month of March. A meal is served at 6:00 before each service.

At our December council meeting, our council voted to grant me a six week sabbatical this summer. Traditionally



sabbaticals are granted every seven years of ministry for a period of three months, and are meant to be for both rest (sabbath) and educational experience. This program is half of that time, and focuses on "rest." The synod

has observed a significant amount of burnout among clergy in the past few years, with many pastors leaving churches not for other job opportunities, but because they did not have the energy to keep going. To combat that burnout, they are developing a program that supports churches in granting sabbaticals by providing an experienced sabbatical interim pastor and paying the cost of this person. They've asked me to participate in this, and our council graciously approved. From mid-May to late-June, I will take a sabbatical and coincidentally my uncle, Tim Canniff-Kuhn, will step in to preach, lead worship, and provide some pastoral care. Our deacon, Beka will also be available for pastoral care and leadership. While these past few years have not been as hard for Holy Comforter as they have been for many other congregations, it has been a very stressful time as we have had to be in almost constant transition. Taking a sabbatical for some time of renewal is an incredible gift that our council agreed to give, and I am thankful to be called to a congregation that cares about my well-being. It is not lost on me that most of you probably feel like you could use a sabbatical as well, which only adds to my gratitude for this opportunity.

As for my plans during that time, I intend it to be a mixture of travel, reading, and intentional time with my family. My extended family has been planning a trip for Italy for years, which will be the last week of the sabbatical. I have applied for a grant that will allow Jenn and I to travel to Ireland the first week, something I have been dreaming of for almost 20 years now, getting to experience spiritual sites, the countryside, and culture of Ireland. I am building up a little library of books I want to read that aren't directly related to upcoming church activities, which makes it hard to get to. I especially am looking at emotional intelligence and thinking through how it relates and adds to my pastoral care. And I look forward to being able to be present with my family both as school wraps up and summer begins. This is always a gift and intentionality with vacation time, and I am excited about doing so for an extended time.

Taking time of sabbath is actually dictated by God, both for rest as well as spiritual renewal and relationship with God. I am immensely grateful for the gift that you all are giving me by granting this time for me. My prayer, as is true with most self-care, is that it does not stop with benefiting just me. I hope that this time is a gift for my family (they may disagree once I am actually around more), my friends, and the wonderful congregation I serve. I hope that it allows me to be the best version of myself as I continue to serve Christ through Holy Comforter.
