into Youth Gathering prep. In July of 2024 the Youth Gathering will be hosted by the city of New Orleans! The Youth Gathering is open to all rising 9<sup>th</sup> to graduating 12<sup>th</sup> graders, this weeklong faith forming experience can't be recreated! The theme of the Gathering is Created to Be. Each day has a different word and experience to describe it. There is an interactive learning day provides unique learning experiences for our young people, like The Dwelling. Interactive learning day can be a time to chill or play with hammock villages and/or games. This day is flexible and gives us the opportunity to tend to what our group needs. There is an Accompaniment Day where groups can pick how the learn and serve. Action projects are projects with hammers and paint brushes. Advocacy projects are projects that are geared towards learning and spreading awareness. Awareness projects are geared toward learning and challenging us. The last day is a Synod Day. Synod day is what it sounds like, we will worship with the other youth of North Carolina and then will get to explore the city together.

Each Bishop is asked to appoint one person as the "Gathering Synod Champion". This person accompanies church leaders all over their synod as they get ready for the Gathering. This looks like equipping people with information, building excitement for a long-awaited Gathering experience, and planning the actual Synod Day worship and shenanigans to follow. Our North Carolina Synod Day Champion is me! It's so exciting to walk with

youth ministers, leaders, and advocates, as they prepare for this incredible faith forming experience. Not only does this role give me the opportunity to support North Carolina leaders, it gives me the ability to know and plan some really cool stuff for our youth to experience. Serving the Gathering in this role allows me to serve in the Gathering AND attend the Gathering with our youth. When I was asked to consider this role, my first question was "will I still be able to share this experience with my youth?". This role lets me do that and have the inside scoop as we start planning! The Youth Gathering is incomparable to other youth trips, it's unique in its ability to share how big Lutheran youth ministry is. It's an incredible example that our youth are not alone in their faith. It's powerful in the ways it gives our young people an opportunity to live their faith. What a gift it is to take young people on such a moving, challenging, and powerful trip. I'll never forget our trip to Houston, one of our youth shared that he saw God in the mass gatherings each night. This trip gives youth the experience and see God.



How can you not be excited for that?! To be a part of this experience, was impossible to say no to. NOLA, here we come!

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during March was \$2,667.46. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$27,069. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2023 is \$28,901.58. The year-to-date deficit, through March 31, was \$18,003.98. Year-to-date spending was \$2,207.63 below the amount planned in the 2023 budget. What a difference 3 years can make. Remember where we were Easter 2020? The sanctuary doors are locked and we are broadcasting Virtual services for the better part of that year, with worship that whole summer in the parking lot. I was thinking about all that as we were preparing our festival service of worship for Easter Sunday this year; everyone now singing robustly, and unmasked. That in itself is transforming. Many visitors are entering our doors again...not always certain who are visiting family members and who are intentional seekers, but delighted to see visitors in our midst regardless of their reason for attending.

Many of the comments that I hear from "first timers" of our services of worship are along the lines of, "Man, this is work!" I know that in some traditions the congregation is more a part of viewing the religious experience performed by others; to sit back and watch...to be consumed. Nothing sinful or illegal about that, but that is a big part of why I am Lutheran; the full assembly participating from Gathering to Sending...and everything in between.

I remember one particular service of worship that I attended a few years ago as a pew sitter. It was a Lutheran service, and for the most part following the Liturgy as we do here at Holy Comforter. But I found myself not bored, but feeling like I needed to be doing something else. It finally occurred to me that I am so used to playing keys, changing registration, cueing the choir, coordinating the music from the beginning and conclusion of offertories and communion flow, and other tasks; that it is no longer always in my DNA to just follow the bulletin page by page.

In spite of that I feel ministered to and able to worship because of all of you; through word and sacrament offered by clergy, through the leadership of our choir, and the blending of voices throughout the congregation. For all this, and so much more...I give thanks for all of you!

Council was incredibly supportive, and up for the task of reorienting some of those responsibilities. We really do have a wonderful and willing council, wise and faithful people who love the ministry of Holy Comforter and are willing to work for it. Pastor Tim and Deacon Beka will share pastoral care responsibilities, with Beka being the first to be called and she will work with Pastor Tim if he should be involved as well, and he will make visits to folks who are homebound during his time here. You all will love Pastor Tim, for the record. Our office manager, Chelsea, now has her feet under her, getting through Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter with us, and is such a gift to the staff and our work here. Greg continues to be his wonderful self, spoiling us by being more gracious and talented than we deserve, and you all, our congregation, continue to offer grace to us, to step up when needs arise, to care for each other authentically and beautifully. While I'm selfishly hoping I come back and am missed at least a little bit so I feel needed, I am honestly proud of this congregation at every level for your faithfulness to each other and this ministry, and feel quite comfortable leaving this ministry in your hands. Also, while I'm taking a 6 week sabbatical, God is not, and the Holy Spirit will continue to move and work in you and through this place. Of that I have no doubt.
