



FIRST READING Exodus 32:7-14

A reading from the thirty-second chapter of Exodus.

While Moses is on Mount Sinai, the people grow restless and make a golden calf to worship. Today's reading shows Moses as the mediator between an angry God and a sinful people. Moses reminds God that the Israelites are God's own people and boldly asks mercy for them.

⁷The LORD said to Moses, "Go down at once! Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; ⁸they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" ⁹The LORD said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. ¹⁰Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation."

¹¹But Moses implored the LORD his God, and said, "O LORD, why does your wrath burn hot against your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with great power and with a mighty hand? ¹²Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out to kill them in the mountains, and to consume them from the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce wrath; change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. ¹³Remember Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, 'I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants, and they shall inherit it forever.'" ¹⁴And the LORD changed his mind about the disaster that he planned to bring on his people.

SECOND READING

1 Timothy 1:12-17

A reading from the first chapter of 1 Timothy.


The letters to Timothy are called the Pastoral Epistles because they contain advice especially intended for leaders in the church. Here the mercy shown to Paul, who once persecuted the church, is cited as evidence that even the most unworthy may become witnesses to the grace of God.

¹²I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, ¹³even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, ¹⁴and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁵The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the foremost. ¹⁶But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal

life. ¹⁷To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

GOSPEL Luke 15:1–10

P The holy gospel according to St. Luke, the fifteenth chapter.

Jesus tells two stories that suggest a curious connection between the lost being found and sinners repenting. God takes the initiative to find sinners, each of whom is so precious to God that his or her recovery brings joy in heaven.

¹Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to [Jesus.] ²And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

³So he told them this parable: ⁴"Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? ⁵When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. ⁶And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' ⁷Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous


persons who need no repentance.



Nutritious School Lunches Children see one food ad for every 5 minutes of cartoons they watch and, since children watch an average of 20 hours of TV per week AND very few of the ads are for fruits and vegetables, few children get good information about proper nutrition. As a result, only about 1% of all children have eating patterns consistent with dietary recommendations. Over the last several years a more sedentary lifestyle (due to video games and increased hours of watching

TV) and obesity have caused high cholesterol and Type 2 diabetes to emerge as rising epidemics in our pediatric population. These, in turn put our children at higher risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, cancer, stroke, and osteoporosis. The effects of unhealthy eating also may include iron deficiency anemia, eating disorders, and tooth decay. Let's make it a point to help our children develop good, lifelong eating habits by packing good, nutritious school lunches for them now. Here are some tips: 1) Include your children in planning the lunch; they tend to eat healthier if they have a say. 2) Create a weekly school menu – being organized helps avoid morning panics in packing a lunch. 3) Make a game out of choosing a lunch menu – let your smaller children decorate food group index cards and then pick a card from each group when it's time to pack. 4) Allow your children to choose a fun snack or dessert to go along with their lunch. 5) Pack a surprise in each lunch, such as stickers or an encouraging note - this adds an element of fun to a traditional lunch. Most of all, 6) Be a good role model and choose YOUR lunches wisely!
