Treasurer's Report for November 2023

Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during November was \$6,854.16. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$20,783.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2023 is \$28,901.58. The year-to-date deficit, through November 30, was \$78,215.11. Year-to-date spending was \$3,982.05 below the amount planned in the 2023 budget. The foregoing table provides additional perspective and comparisons with offering income, expenses and budgets in prior years.

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I've never been one for New Year's resolutions. No judgment if they've worked for you, I'll gladly celebrate them with you if they have, but for me the timing of the new year never made me care about something in a new way to substantively change behavior. I do, however, appreciate the value of goals, the way that they can keep us focused, the way that they help our behavior match our named values. While it is by no means comprehensive, our Purpose Statement and Core Values that we discerned together in the past couple of years are our named values. This fall our council named three goals that we hope will keep us headed in the right direction and living into our named values. Our goals are to maintain ministry excellence, namely funding the ministry we currently have, to develop a plan to address homelessness and hunger in our area, and to discern strategies for evangelism. We believe these goals to be in line with our named values, and we hope to live into these goals in 2024.

We have some first steps to live into those goals. We are working with a professional organization to lead us in our stewardship work, not just in the fall but throughout the year. They've been enlightening to work with. In January and early February we will take steps to work towards our other two goals. We are inviting someone from The Dwelling, in Winston-Salem, a ministry of and for folks experiencing homelessness, to do some education for us and give us some perspective on what these folks might be going through. We will then have a brainstorming session together, with anyone who would like to be a part of it, to think through how our ministry for folks experiencing homelessness here might evolve. We will later have a brainstorming session around evangelism as well. From these sessions we will develop strategies to work towards these goals through the year.

I encourage everyone to be involved in these brainstorming sessions, as well as to find ways to join in the work beyond as well. Caring for the poor and downtrodden, as well as spreading the good news of Christ's love and redemption for all people, are core to our call as disciples of Christ. If we do little else, we should be doing these things, and talking about how we can be doing them better, since these are things we do engage in already at some level. We don't all have specific knowledge or experience in these areas, and some people feel called to this work more than others, but we should all find ways we can contribute to it, be aware of it, and consider how we can grow in it. We're still confirming the dates for these events, but keep an eye out, and together let's discern how we can live out our named values, as disciples of Christ, through these goals for 2024.

Some of us have heard a bit about the recent upgrade to our pipe organ. Not enough space in a paragraph or two to explain all the details; but we went basically from 1980's to 21st Century technology. The pipe organ at Holy Comforter still looks and sounds the same to the person in the pew; But with playback capability it gives the organist the flexibility to hear the choir from anywhere in the worship space...just as the congregation does on Sunday morning. Just this aspect alone is a glorious leap forward in understanding the true sound blend of the offertory anthem, for example. We also have been "experimenting" with other capabilities such as utilizing the programing of the carillon before and after worship, as well as use in varied parts of the service such as prelude/postlude and hymn accompaniments.

Another feature is the ability to spot tune any one of the 1883 pipes, without having to climb up and down ladders for each individual note. Nor is it now always necessary to hire someone/or volunteer someone to hold each key as it is tuned. I am happy to demonstrate the workings of this *"King of Instruments"* to interested individuals. The pipe organ gets this description for a good reason. After all, what other musical instrument in our worship space weighs in excess of 22,000 lbs.

No church budgeted funds were used for this upgrade project, but only through the generosity of members and friends who contribute to our ongoing music fund. These typically come through gifts of honorariums and memorial gifts.

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A big shout out to all of our church musicians who led our services of worship both morning and night through the season of Advent and Christmas. Our choirs are a great bunch of talented folks with which to work. They are consistently ministers to this church musician throughout the year. So to everyone in the church choir, chamber choir, handbell choir, and youth handbell ensemble...well done, good and faithful servants!
