Holy Comforter's operating deficit (expenses in excess of offering income) during April was \$5,823.01. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$27,950.25. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2023 is \$28,901.58. The year-to-date deficit, through April 30, was \$23,506.95. Year-to-date spending was \$2,284.62 above the amount planned in the 2023 budget. The adjacent table provides additional perspective and comparisons with offering income, expenses and budgets in prior years.





Friends in Christ,

As you read this, our journey together is at the midpoint. Pastor Micah half-way in his six-week sabbatical. I am very appreciative of the welcome I've received. It is easy to feel "at home" when we are together in worship. I'm thankful for the leadership and guidance of gifted staff and the ways that folks in the congregation perform ministry acts inside the building and outside in the community without the need for pastoral input. Holy Comforter is indeed the Body of Christ!

Professional leaders in the church, like Pastor Micah and Deacon Beka, have positions that make it difficult to turn their vocational work "on and off." The Sabbath Day and High Holy Days, when many of us can be most relaxed, are their busiest of days and their positions require them to always be "on call" even on a planned day off. A sabbatical allows enough time for Pastor Micah to wind down and let go, getting to a place where Holy Comforter is not always the first thing on his mind. It also can become the occasion for us to think about the value of Sabbath rest for ourselves.

Throughout scripture, the value of sabbath rest is lifted. On the 7th day of Creation, God rested from all God's work. The law of Moses forbids work on the sabbath. Even the land is to be fully rested from planting every 7 years so that it might regenerate to produce more fruit in future years. The emphasis of Sabbath recognition is punctuated in the giving of the 3rd commandment. God wants us to slow down and regularly "hit the pause button" of our lives. Jesus clarifies the purpose of sabbath further by saying "The Sabbath was made for humans, not humans for the Sabbath." (Mark 2:27) Sabbath is not for God, it's for us! It's not that God needs us to rest but rather it's good for us to rest! It's not even that God needs a time designated to praise God, but it is of great value for us as God's children.

Our world and our lives are increasingly busy. While I once lived in a time and place that on

Sunday's much of the world shut down and our family went on aimless afternoon car rides after worship, I now live in a time that we have a hard time slowing for a yellow traffic light. When I first moved to South Carolina to attend Southern Seminary, I needed to become familiar with "blue laws" that limited the sale of certain items to restrict activity and promote rest but now stores are open on Sunday morning, so we purchase whatever our hearts desire. The work phone calls that once went to an answering machine to be checked on Monday now ring in our pockets, making it more challenging to "get away," especially in a society that values a person's worth based on productivity.

Amid a culture that does not value sabbath rest, the witness of scripture remains the same. It is still important to have down time to make us mindful of our daily blessings and regenerate our creative selves. However, it is not the job of government to create laws which limit one's activity nor is it in the best interest of a capitalistic economy to shut down businesses to limit our options. Rather it is the responsibility of The Church to teach the value of sabbath rest and of us as faithful followers of Jesus to live out what God has deemed best for us. To do this, we need to be intentional in finding ways to shut off outside forces that clammer for our attention and focus on sabbath rest. This can look different for each of us as some can use Sunday or another particular day for rest, while others can carve out quiet time each day, and yet others can observe a longer sabbatical.

The Holy Spirit has given us gifts to use to fulfill God's mission here on earth. We have been called to carry out Christ's work as the incarnation of Jesus' hands and feet. But we are also commanded to slow down, for our own good, and find rest in the reassuring promises of God so that we might become more mindful of God's presence in the world and in our lives and that we might be renewed in our Christian vocations that we might be even more fruitful in our work of spreading the Good News of God's love in word and deed. May God bless and guide you in this journey.

& Music Notes J

Our church musician ministers are on a bit of a Sabbatical themselves; with a respite from regular rehearsals during the month of June and July. These folks donate literally hundreds of combined hours throughout the year in worship leadership and preparation. As we discuss in closing rehearsals...any choir member that is in town on Sunday morning during the summer is invited to attend our regular 10:10 sessions as we prepare to lead the congregation in worship and praise.

During this summer we will be upgrading our pipe organ console. Imagine if you still had a computer that was operating with 1980 - 1990 technology. Our instrument was contracted to be built in 1990 and, while it is a pipe organ, it has programmable switching systems and components which allow the organist to select sound combinations almost instantaneously. For example we currently have 8 levels of memory, and when complete there will be 250 levels; quite an improvement!

The organist will also now have capability to store programmed music. I generally record 5 minutes of sacred music on the synthesizer each week, which is used while communing with the choir. The same can be accomplished now with the organ. A remote control will also allow one individual to manually tune any one of the 1883 pipes without the aid of having another individual physically holding keys. There are an array of other benefits to speak of, but that will be discussed once the installation is complete. This project is a blessing to accomplish, as we are well into our second generation of pipe organ use. The instrument has served us well and will continue to do so as we are upgraded into the 21st century. The cost is underwritten through the generosity of donors who contribute through honorariums and memorials to the Holy Comforter Music Fund. The installation week has yet to be determined...but anticipated in the month of July.

For the last six months I have had the delightful and joyful opportunity to see these bunnies love their neighbors. They have visited nursing homes, preschools, elementary schools, and US!

Luther Rhyne and his family came to see the bunnies, along with lots of others, and said "I don't know about the therapy part, but these bunnies made me happy". That my friends IS the therapy part, it is the loving your neighbor part. Gabriel Kearney held Willie for several minutes and afterwards he said, "that was so relaxing, thanks!". Not only did kids of all ages get to hold these sweet creatures, but parents and adults got to have the joy of being loved by Bunny Blessings too. I know I say this a lot, but faith can be fun. Faith can have all of creation in one room. Faith can be all ages sharing in quality time together building community. God was in our joy yesterday, God was in the love from and for those bunnies, God was in our play. What a gift to have Bunny Blessings come love on us, and we hope to keep loving on them. Join us in September for a bunny project for God's Work Our Hands.
